Kevin Sheller, who owns the Schaumburg-based AQUARIUM ARTISTS (814 Mansfield Ct., Schaumburg; 847-962-9677, aquariumartists.com), has a slate of contractors at his disposal to install his signature freshwater. aguariums, which use live plants and colorful fish for a lush effect that mimics a pond. "Most people say they've never seen anything like it," he says. (He maintains that captive-bred freshwater fish have a lower mortality rate than saltwater fish because they go through fewer hands in their journey to the tank.) After installation, maintenance is virtually trouble free for the owner: The tank includes a mechanical tray that automatically feeds the fish and, for \$100 to \$250 a month, the company will make cleaning house calls.
